## **Holiday Plans and Budgets**

**Key financial ideas** 

- ★ You need to explore your options and their costs.
- ★ You may have the same options as someone else, but your decision may not be the same as theirs.

You need

- ★ 2 copies of blank holiday plan forms (see copymaster)
- ★ a calculator or a spreadsheet program (optional)

★ a classmate

## **Activity**

Alana and Caitlyn decide to use the Internet and Nana's advertisements and notes to work out what their holiday activities might cost (excluding airfares).



With a classmate, use your copies of the holiday plan forms and the information on page 5 to make up two different activity plans for the Murphys for 8 days. (You could use the Internet or the library to find more details about each activity.) At the same time, you'll need to work out the costs.

For plan A: Choose options you think the family would want to do if they didn't have to worry about how much money they spend.

For plan B: Choose the options you think are the cheapest, making sure that the family still do something interesting each day.

Then we'll have some idea of how much money we'll need.

Meals:

We can give you breakfasts, packed lunches, and tea if you're here. You can also eat out cheaply: per person, between A\$5-\$10 for lunch and A\$10-\$20 each for tea.

Some transport options:

To/from Brisbane airport: about \$35 for a taxi. (Our car is too small!) There are also buses, shuttles, and the Airtrain (\$30/family).

Car hire: about \$90 a day or \$400 a week, plus petrol costs.

Public transport around Brisbane: daily ticket for bus, train, ferry per child.

Gold Coast: You can get there by coach or train — allow about \$220 altogether for return fares.

Costs for activities around Brisbane

Queensland Museum: admission free



Science Centre in the Queensland Museum: \$28 per family

Museum of Brisbane:

admission free

Queensland Art Gallery:

admission free. Workshops for children: \$6 per child

Sir Thomas Brisbane Planetarium:

\$5 per family. Also Cosmic Skydome shows: \$31 per family

Streets Beach: admission free

Brisbane cycle hire: \$30 half day, \$40 full day per bike. Guided tour of Brisbane: \$38 per person





Children's holiday programmes: costs vary.



City Botanic Gardens: admission free

Lone Pine Koala Sanctuary:

admission \$39 per family; \$15 per person to cuddle a koala; \$1 per bag of pellets to feed kangaroos. Get there by cruise boat: \$120 per family, or bus: \$3.40 per person.

Alma Park Zoo: \$55 per family. Get there by train:

\$4 per person.

Australia Zoo: about an hour's drive north of Brisbane: tickets from \$29 per person or \$146 per family

Roma Street Parkland: admission free



In-line skate hire: \$13 for 2 hours. Tour of Brisbane: \$10 each

Dreamworld: adult \$64, child \$42

Sea World: adult \$64, child \$42

Movie World: adult \$64, child \$42

Other activities

Wet'n'Wild: \$42/adult, \$28/child

Hot-air ballooning: 1 hour: \$295/ adult,

\$200/ child

Infinity (maze and light show): \$68/family

Horse-riding treks: 2 hours: \$65/adult, \$40/child
